List Of Activities That Are Not To Be Financed

Annex 1

The activities listed below have been identified as "activities that are not to be financed by TSKB", which will be effective as of the date on which the TSKB Sustainability Policy goes into effect. TSKB undertakes not to directly finance the following projects/activities to the extent it is concerned:

- production or trading of products which are unlawful pursuant to Turkish laws, regulations or international regulations and agreements, or which are subject to international prohibitions;
- production or trading of products containing PCB (Polychlorinated Biphenyl);
- production and trading of pharmaceuticals, pesticides/herbicides and other hazardous substances prohibited in international arena;
- production and trading of any internationally-banned substance that is harmful to the ozone layer;
- trading of wild fauna or flora and the production or trading of any product regulated by the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES);
- the cross-border movement of any form of waste that is prohibited by Turkish law or international laws;
- production or trading of firearms and munitions¹;
- production and trading of tobacco and cigarettes¹,
- gambling, casinos and similar initiatives;
- production and trading of radioactive substances²;
- production or trading of unbonded (fibrous) asbestos (does not apply to the use or procurement of cement slabs less than 20% of whose weight consists of non-fibrous or fibrous asbestos);
- the use of drift nets longer than 2,500 meters in length in sea fishing;
- Any project involving forced labor, or any project related to production that involves the
 exploitation of child labor or employs children in potentially injurious or dangerous
 activities;³⁴
- any project that restricts individuals' personal rights or violates human rights;
- any project that involves commercial logging operations in any primary tropical rainforest;
- any activity that is prohibited by Turkish laws and regulations or by international agreements governing the protection of biodiversity resources or the cultural heritage; any project located in any protected area, critical habitat area, or natural/cultural heritage area unless adequate compensatory/mitigatory measures are taken; and
- any green-field coalfired thermal power plants and coal mining investments for electricity generation purposes.

⁴Forced child labor refers to cases where children are economically exploited or where the child's education, health, physical, mental, intellectual, moral or social development is prevented or harmed.



¹This prohibition does not apply to project sponsors that are not involved significantly in these activities. "Not involved significantly" refers to cases where the relevant activity is not the primary field of operation and/or main business segment of the project sponsor.

²This does not apply in cases where the pharmaceutical materials, quality control and measuring equipment and the radioactive substance's source are determined by TSKB as insignificant and/or appropriately protected/sealed.

³Forced labor refers to cases where people do not work voluntarily, as well as all works or services extracted from an individual under the menace of penalty or coercion.
